#### IN PROGRESS LAW REVIEW ARTICLES

A lot of my work currently focuses on the intersection of creating works and copyright, particularly the copyrightability boundaries of art, determining the copyright status of works (e.g. public domain), and exploring the actual freedoms to create that occur once a work is in the public domain (as an artist, as a scholar).

**Registering a Modicum of Creativity:** I am filing Copyright registrations for a variety of categories to test the boundaries of *copyrightability*. This has been an ongoing study, and includes artists, musicians, photographers, dancers, short fiction, quilters (of course), and many more. The registrations will be submitted and we will wait to see what the results will be. Applications will be submitted in the Spring 2025.

Klee on Cricut: A Study in the Public Domain. This work examines when a work is in the public domain, and how much creativity is needed to create new copyrightable works. This uses reproducing Paul Klee's work on a Cricut (an arts cutting machine) and contemplates the boundaries of the public domain including AI fakes, overreaching licenses by the Artist Rights Society, and the march of the public domain each year. The work will be center on the work of Paul Klee (d. 1940), but will include additional works by other artists as well as recent public domain figures like Popeye, Winnie-the-Pooh, and of course, Mickey and Minnie Mouse. Expected completion Feb 2026. This will also study what counts as a derivative work, and ties into the third project I am working on. This will be a law review article. I am currently learning how to operate the Cricut, and am experimenting with Klee's work.

Appropriation, Copyright and Art after Warhol/Warhol. In 2023, the U.S. Supreme Court found in favor of a photographer, Lynn Goldsmith, holding that Andy Warhol's use of her photograph to create his iconic artwork was not transformative or fair. Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts, Inc. v. Goldsmith, 598 U.S. 508 (2023). The question we are left with is what now? What are the copyright parameters of making art? How does this fair use decision impact the creation of art? Did Andy Warhol transform our thoughts about the making of art twice? This work focuses on the tools of creating art, particularly reference photographs. This is a new piece I plan to start in Summer 2025.

Introducing the War Generation: A Study in Generational Theory, Patience and the Public Domain. When I was a doctoral student, I found out that the works that I was using were in the public domain (exciting) and then restored (sad). Now, over two decades later, the war generation works, published between 1928-1933 are coming into the public domain. What does it mean for scholars when this happens permissions is no longer needed. This first piece is designed as a law review article. This will also be connected to a full revision of my work on the

war generation, with the recognition that some of the works are now in the public domain. I will also start to work in two additional chapters for this project, one on art produced out of the First World War, and the other on Queering the War Generation. This project looks at how scholarship is/not transformed once the sources being used are in the public domain.

**Barbie Explains Copyright, Trademark and even Patents** A full draft is written and needs to be revised. This is a co-authored piece with Sidne K. Gard.

After Twenty Years: Public Domain Today. With the Sony Bono Copyright Extension Act, published works coming into the public domain were frozen for twenty years. Pre-1923 works was a common term one saw. Works published in 1922 and before had a maximum term of 75 years from publication, and came into the public domain in 1998. But a work published in 1923 had a term of 95. It wasn't until 2018 that we had works coming into the public domain. But by this time, our world had become rather complicated. What does it mean to be a work in the public domain today? This is an investigation of how much entertainment companies are relying on fair use, or clearing and getting licenses anyway. I will be conducting interviews throughout the Spring and early Summer. A draft is in progress.

#### **EARLY STAGE PROJECTS**

*Crafting First Families* will look at the nature of thread, yarn, fabric and paint across U.S. presidential history, through the first families. We will also be discussing the nature of copyright and intellectual property as the lessons within the book. Final form: so many things! Book publication, small Creative Commons projects for K-12 schools, small exhibits, website, and lessons about copyright/trademark as part of them. Likely a law review article on using presidential archival materials as well.

Finding Chaie (co-authored with Sid Gard). This is a personal journey about genealogy, copyright, and finding what is lost. This is a search for lost family, identity, and the relationship of those elements to the law. Pauline Finkelstein would become a citizen of the U.S. in August 1933. She had been in the U.S. since 1906, when she came with her mom at age 1 from Poland, and was at the time named Chaie. She and her daughter would work to erase the past. It would only be with her great granddaughter that the search for the story of Chaie, and those before her would be unearthed. How do we understand who we are when the past gets hidden and forgotten? How do legal documents help us to find who we are? And what role do generations born a century later have in restoring and remembering? This is part law, part creative writing, part photography, part archival hunt, part language experiment. (We are learning Yiddish, Pauline/Chaie's first language, as part of the project).

# Just Wanna Medallion/Just Wanna Museum: a Study in Copyright and Construction

What do we learn about copyright from medallion quilts held in museums? Patterns interpreted by Willow Olson. Completion of manuscript expected May 2022. Most of the first draft of the manuscript has been written, and we are now contemplating the next step in publication and dissemination of the materials. But we hit a bump that required me to do research into the copyright status of fine art works and return to this once that work is completed. I would also like to reach out to museums and get their involvement with the project.

# Complicated Toys: A Study in Copyright, Trademark, and World Building.

This is a two-year study that focuses on the role of toys in our creative ecosystem, looking in particular at major brands: Legos, Minecraft, Barbie, etc. The work brings together research, interviews, a symposium, and an edited collection of articles related to toys. This will be published by the Journal of the Copyright Society and will be the EIC Study for the next two years. I will be writing a major piece that brings together what is learned from the variety of conversations and parts to this. Interviews, research, and preparing for the symposium, as well as a draft would be created during the summer. Expected completion 2026. This will be a law review article, an edited issue of the journal, and potentially a book publication. This also draws on the work that begun under a LBC Faculty grant.

## **COMPLETED ONGOING PROJECTS**

Just Wanna Quilt: A Research Podcast and Entrepreneurial Experiment. 2017-2025
Beginning in 2017, a five-year project focused on understanding the quilting industry through interviews that will be broadcast as podcasts. The project will also include law review articles (originality of polka dots, patentability of rules, etc.), and writings for quilters on copyright and being a quilt entrepreneur. The project includes nightly (yes) quilting, blogging, and engaging in social media. See the website: www.justwannaquilt.com. As of Feb 2025, I have interviewed over400 interviews, 300 of which have aired so far. The podcast went live on Feb 6, 2018 and is available at iTunes. Two books are in progress as well, and one law review article focused on copyright. At our peak, we had around 4500 people listening per day, and we post 3-4 episodes a week. We also conducted 65 COVID-19 masks interviews with scientists, the medical field and sewists, leading to a 2-day ten hour long Homemade Mask Summit in June 2020. We have also had booths and participated in educational sessions at the International Quilt Festival,

Quilt Market, QuiltCon, and H+H Homemade Craft wholesale show. We have started a small press, and we have become a dealer of Grace longarm machines. We have a Facebook group with over 4000 members, and a present on TikTok and Instagram. We created Quilting Army Krewe, LLC as a spin-out company.

## **Durationator Copyright Experiment, 2007-2017.**

This work was cited by the U.S. Supreme Court in Golan v. Holder, 2012. Major works have come out of this, both law review articles and the *Durationator Copyright Files* (Limited Times Publication, 2021). This was a software program, an entrepreneurial program, and a philosophy about the boundaries of property, the public domain and copyright. We had a contract with Thomson Reuters, and we worked with MOMA, the Frick Collection, the Library of Congress, the Internet Archive, Culture/Tech, and many other cultural institutions. Over 100 students worked on the project in one capacity or another. We were about to map and code copyright duration, retroactivity, treaty relations, and fair use.
