The article is light on the kind of analysis that general academic readers might look for. For example, Dean Burke criticizes the Trump administration's policies as "antithetical to the BLM's [i.e., the Bureau of Land Management's] multiple-use mission," but she does not grapple with the question of how to give teeth to a mandate of "management on the basis of multiple-use."\* To support her point, she contrasts the Obama administrations goal "to restore the proper balance." with the Trump administration's emphasis on energy development. Also, many of the policies she describes are just that—nonbinding (in theory) policies, rather than regulations. In my experience, this is typical of the Department of Interior's approach to oil and gas program regulation (although my experience is mostly limited to offshore oil and gas). Dean Burke notes that one court ruled that one such policy was illegal because it was, in effect, a regulation promulgated in violation of the Administrative Procedure Act's requirements for notice and comment. It would be interesting to read an analysis of this and other deep-seated problems with BLM's programs under both administrations. But it is hardly fair to criticize an author for writing a valuable article (which was already 56 pages long) instead of the article I might have preferred to read.

In sum, this is a well-done and valuable article by a sophisticated expert in the field.

\*She does say "With this mandate-known as the BLM's 'multiple-use mission'—no use is uniformly privileged over another." This statement is not sourced (and is not the statutory definition of 43 U.S.C. 1702(c)). But both Dean Burke's definition and the statute leave a lot of room for interpretation and discretion. In general, Dean Burke descriptions of "multiple use" rely on unpromulgated guidance (which, in theory is nonbinding), rather than statutes or regulations. See. e.g., notes 23, 24, and 34. In footnote 239, however, she does cite the Federal Land Policy Act mandate "that management be on the basis of multiple use and sustained yield unless otherwise specified by law." 43 U.S.C. 1701(7).
